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ABSTRACT

This study is to identify and compare the exponents of seeking information and confirmation used by the native English and Nepali speakers. The researcher, for the study, took the data from the sample population. There were altogether 80 informants in the sample population out of which 40 were Nepali and other 40 were English native speakers. The study was entirely based on the responses from the sample population (i.e. primary data) with the help of the questionnaire distributed to them. Then the exponents given by them were listed for the analysis and interpretation on the basis of which the researcher came up with the conclusion that while seeking information and confirmation. Nepali speakers used more honorific forms than English speakers in general. To be specific, Nepali speakers used more non-honorific forms than English speakers for seeking information from their friends and policemen (by their officers). Similarly, Nepali speakers used non-honorific forms more than English speakers for seeking confirmation from their office clerks, friends and sons. With other relationship, English speakers were found to be using more non-honorific forms than Nepali speakers.

The study is divided into four chapters. **Chapter one**, the introductory chapter, includes general background, review of the related literature objective of the study, and significance of the study. **Chapter two** deals with the methodology applied to carry out the research under which sources of data, sampling procedure, tools for data collection, process of data collection and limitations of the study were presented. **Chapter three** presents analysis and interpretation of the data. In this section both statistical as well as descriptive approach were used. **Chapter four** incorporates findings and recommendations of the research. The concluding part of the thesis is occupied by the references and appendices.
