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Abstract

In this research, an attempt has been made to analyze a protagonist Tara Lata's quest for her female identity in Bharati Mukhrejee's *Desirable Daughters*. Tara, the protagonist of the novel, could not get her real female stable identity throughout the novel be it in Hindu patriarchal society or in American society. In Indian patriarchal society, she could not get her identity due to societal norms and values. More or less, Tara enjoys the freedom in American society as American women do.
