#### **Abstract**

This is the era of both the triumphalism as well as crisis of capitalism. The phony worlds of capitalist culture and obsessed passion of the modern people have produced a lot of evils in the contemporary society. Paulo Coelho's *The Winner Stands Alone* depicts the dark sides of the consumerist culture through the exploration of the underbelly of celebrity culture, where people are servile to the evil influence of capitalism.
