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ABSTRACT

The research work entitled **The Language Used by Nepali and Non-Nepali Writers in the Journals of NELTA** is an attempt to analyze and describe the language used in the articles of NELTA journals in terms of sentence types, voice, and deixis. This study also attempted to find out whether the language used in the articles written by Nepali writers are different from the language used in the articles by non-Nepali writers. This research is a descriptive study and used of only the secondary sources of data. The required data were collected by using observation. The total samples for this study were twenty six articles from NELTA journals. Out of the twenty six articles, thirteen were written by Nepali writers and the same number by Non-Nepali writers. The findings of this research showed that complex sentences, active voice and person deixis were found maximally used or highly frequent in both types of articles. On the other hand, compound sentences mixed voice and time deixis were found the least frequent in both types of articles. Similarly, non-Nepali writers have used complex sentences, passive voice, mixed voice, place deixis and time deixis a little bit higher than those of Nepali writers. On the other hand, Nepali writers were found to use more simple sentences, compound sentences, active voice and person deixis more frequently than those of non-Nepali writers.

This study consists of four chapters. The first chapter deals with general background, review of related literature, objectives and significance of the study. Similarly, second chapter includes sources of data, sampling procedure, tools of data collection, process of data collection and limitations of the study. Likewise, the third chapter deals with the analysis and interpretation of the collected data with the help of different tables. This chapter has used simple statistical tools like percentage and average to lead the study to the conclusion. The last chapter deals with the findings and recommendations based on the analysis and interpretation of data.
