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ABSTRACT

The present study entitled **Tense and Aspect in English and Achhami** was intended to show the comparison of tense and aspect system between English and Achhami dialect. I carried out my research using non-random purposive sampling procedure. A set of questionnaire was prepared as a research tool for the elicitation of the required information and 60 informants of Tikapur Municipality were taken as a sample for the study. The major finding of the research was that there are mainly two tenses: past and non-past (present and future) in Achhami dialect. English does not have unknown and habitual aspects which are found in Achhami dialect and Achhami dialect does not have perfect progressive aspect which is found in English.

This thesis is divided into four main chapters and other sub-chapters. The first chapter deals with general background, the English language, languages of Nepal, dialect and description of tense and aspect. It also includes CA, review of related literature, objectives and significance of the study. The second chapter is concerned with the methodology used in the study. It includes sources of data, population of the study, sampling procedure, tools for data collection, process of data collection and limitations of the study. The third chapter provides the comprehensive picture of the analysis and interpretation of the data. It includes tense and aspect system of Achhami dialect with examples and its comparison with that of the English language. The final chapter lists the major findings and recommendations of the study.
