ABSTRACT

This study has made an attempt to find out the kind of language used in invitation for bids in terms of sentence types, tense, aspect, voice, word class and informality contained on its formal writing. In this study simple sentence, non-past tense, simple aspect, passive voice were found to be maximally used in invitation for bids of all three newspapers published from Nepal and a newspaper published from abroad covering more than half of the total sentences. Even in the formal discourse of tender writing, some degree of informality was integrated which was clear from the use of abbreviations, imperatives and personal pronouns. Similarly, major world class was highly used than minor word class. Even in the major word class noun was found to be highly used.

This thesis comprises of four chapters. The first chapter deals with general background of the study, mass media and their impact in society, newspaper, introduction to bids, review of related literature, objectives, significance and definition of terms of the study.

In the second chapter, the methodology adopted for the completion of the study is presented. It includes sources of data, sampling procedure, tools of data collection, process of data collection and some of the important limitations of the study.

Similarly, the third chapter presents analysis and interpretation of the collected data for the study using simple statistical tools like average and percentage. The comparison has been made mainly between the language used in Nepali English Newspapers and English Newspapers from aboard to reach the general conclusion.

The fourth chapter of this thesis presents the findings and some recommendations based on the analysis and interpretation of the data. At the end references and appendices along with some sample invitation for bids are presented.
