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ABSTRACT

The present study entiled "Pronominals in English, Nepali and Newar" was an attempt to find out Newar pronominals in relation to English and Nepali. Secondly, this research endeavoured to compare and contrast Newar pronominals with those of the English and Nepali languages. The researcher collected the data from both primary and secondary sources to accomplish the task. The primary sources of the data were native speakers of Newar language from Kirtipur Municipality. Different books, journals, theses, website were the secondary sources of the data. The study place was selected through judgemental sampling whereas the study population, i.e. 80 informants were selected using snowball sampling. Interview and questionnaire were used as research tools for data collection. The interview research tool was used for illiterate people and questionnaire was used for literate ones. The collected data were analyzed and interpreted through the tabulation. After studying the data, the findings were drawn. The main findings of the present study are: Newar pronominal system is the most complex in comparison to English and Nepali due to the presence of the affixation, pluralization and alternatives. All the three languages have distinct pronominals but in comparison to English and Nepali, the Newar language has more number of pronominals. The nasalized sounds were found when the singular pronominals are pluralized. Newar personal, reflexive and possessive pronouns are categorized under three persons: 1st, 2nd and 3rd. There is the existence of inclusive and exclusive pronouns in plural number of 1st person personal, reflexive and possessive pronouns. It is also found out that there is the existence of honorific and non-honorific system in 2nd and 3rd person personal, reflexive and possessive pronouns.

This thesis consists of four chapters: introduction, methodology, analysis and interpretation and findings and recommendations. The first chapter deals with a brief introductory survey of the related area of the study including general background, literature review, objectives and significance of the study. The second chapter includes the methodology: sources of data, population of the study, sampling procedure, tools for data collection, process of data collection and limitations of the study. Similarly, chapter three deals with analysis and interpretation of the data and chapter four incorporates findings, recommendations and pedagogical implications of the study.
