ABSTRACT

Skill" aims at finding out the proficiency of the 10th graders in the speaking skill in terms of pronunciation, accuracy, fluency and vocabulary. This study is based on the primary sources of data. The sample population of the study consisted of forty students studying in class 10 from four public secondary schools of Kapilvastu district. The required data were collected by distributing test items to the selected respondents. The responses were recorded in the tape recorder and analyzed.

The research found that the proficiency of the students in speaking skill is not satisfactory
